I am delighted to introduce to you, in this edition of DN, my fellow Cabinet councillors and hope you find our four-page feature on all councillors useful if you want to get in contact with your ward councillor. As the Co-operative Alliance, we will be building on the hard work and achievements of the previous administration and making more improvements for the benefit of people living across Lewes district.

Among these is the £400,000 programme of upgrades to play areas across the district, each one being shaped by the residents and children who use them. With four new public consultations underway, we hope people continue to give us their views on what new equipment and facilities they would like to be installed in their local play area.

It's wonderful to see work taking place this summer on the Cockshut Stream which had been blighted by a non-native invasive plant. This project will realign the stream and create a new 6.8 hectare wetland in Lewes, bringing a host of environmental benefits and better access for people to visit this beautiful landscape – just one example of the way we are finding nature-based solutions to climate change.

Our new Lewes reception area in the former Paperchase building at 6 Cliffe High Street has been welcomed by many residents for its central location. It's a landmark anniversary for Artwave as the festival celebrates 30 years since the council set it up to make the arts more accessible. 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Residents and local children are being asked their views on what improvements they would like at four play areas in Lewes district.

Public consultations have been launched for Valley Dip Play Area in Seaford, Hillcrest Court in Newhaven, Malling Rec in Lewes and Stanley Turner Rec, also in Lewes. The consultations run until 18th August.

Views given in these surveys will help inform what new equipment will be installed there.

This is part of a £400,000 programme by Lewes District Council to upgrade and redevelop play areas

across Lewes district over two years.

Earlier this year, Lewes District Council held surveys about improvements to two playgrounds in Landport, Lewes – Landport Recreation Ground and De La Warr Green, and two in Seaford – at Aquila Park and The Peverells.

Thanks to around 200 people who took part in the surveys. Work on these four play areas will be completed by the end of the year.

Work is underway to realign a stream and create a new wetland habitat in Lewes, bringing an array of environmental benefits.

The project is a partnership between Lewes District Council, Ouse and Adur Rivers Trust, Lewes Railway Land Wildlife Trust and South Downs National Park Authority and will bring huge biodiversity benefits and reduce flood risk in the area.

Adjacent to the Lewes Brooks, the Cockshut is a 3km long chalk stream that flows from springs at the foot of the South Downs in Kingston, eventually joining the River Ouse before flowing out to sea. The Cockshut

is currently clogged up by a non-native invasive plant called parrot's feather. By realigning the stream, the old channel can be filled in, eradicating the problem plant, and the stream will flow into a newly created 6.8 hectare wetland, to the east of the Stanley Turner Ground. The Cockshut Stream Restoration Project will be completed by autumn 2023.

In addition, the council recently purchased Landport Brooks, almost 37 acres of land in Lewes, to deliver environmental improvements and conserve the area's biodiversity.

"It's fantastic to see work taking place on this project which will not only enhance biodiversity, help with flood management and carbon storage, but also allow the stream to flow unimpeded, unpolluted and with its native plants and wildlife protected.

Lewes District Council has opened a new public reception area at 6 Cliffe High Street in Lewes town centre.

Residents can visit the reception with enquiries during offices hours, Monday to Friday. In addition, people can also contact an adviser via 'live chat', available on all pages of the council website, lewes-eastbourne.gov.uk

World-renowned arts charity Charleston has moved into the former council offices in Southover Road.

Charleston in Lewes will open in September with

Bring No Clothes: Bloomsbury and Fashion, the first major exhibition to explore the influence and legacy of the Bloomsbury Group on fashion.

Alongside this will be a free programme of co-produced community projects, artist-led workshops and gallery activities, welcoming families and young people. There will be a learning programme for local state schools, further education and higher education groups. A pop-up café run by Lewes-based Caccia & Tails and a shop providing retail space for local artists and makers will complete the offer.

Lewes District Council is offering funds to residents on a low income who will miss out on the government's £900 cost-of-living payments.

The 'Safety Net' payment is available to eligible residents who are struggling to keep warm, buy enough food or pay essentials.

To qualify, you must currently receive housing benefit or a council tax reduction but not one of the meanstested benefits that would qualify you for a cost-ofliving payment from the government, unless you also qualify for a disability or carer's benefit.

The award is a one-off payment of £400 and will be paid into your bank account. The funding is limited and will be paid out on a first-come, first-served basis. Apply via the grants portal www.grantapproval.co.uk

Warm spaces

Twenty Warm Spaces in Lewes district welcomed hundreds of people a week over the winter. The council provided £50,000 to voluntary sector partners to set up and run the warm spaces amid soaring energy costs, as part of its work to combat the cost of living crisis.



Help with food

If you are finding it difficult to afford food, local community food projects might be able to help. Contact Lewes District Citizens Advice (see page 14) to discuss your situation.

They can give benefits, budgeting and debt advice while also offering support including a referral to your local food bank and they may be able to help with a fuel voucher.

Community hubs, voluntary and community sector organisations and local authorities can also make referrals to food banks. Once your referral has been received by your local food bank, they will be in touch to arrange collection of emergency food parcels.

Artwave is celebrating its 30th anniversary and this year's festival of creativity is set to be the biggest in its history.

Running over three weekends from 2nd to 17th September, Artwave will feature artwork from more than 1,000 creatives at over 180 exhibitions across Lewes district including the opportunity to visit artists' private homes as well as more unusual venues such as a windmill, farm and train station.

When it began in 1993, the festival featured the work of 70 artists across 18 events and has steadily grown to become a popular fixture in the region's cultural calendar.

Carole Buchan, who organised the first-ever Artwave, said her aim as Lewes District Council's first arts officer was "to make the arts accessible to all".

She recalled how, in 1999, Rodin's famous sculpture The Kiss was exhibited in Lewes.

"Lewes District Council negotiated with the Arts Council to 'borrow' Rodin's The Kiss for the town, where it had first been created," said Carole.

"Under the strictest security it was brought from The Tate in London to the Town Hall in the middle of the night. The result was a magnificent exhibition which launched what became known as Lewes Town of

Sculpture and became part of Artwave that year.

"Artwave has picked up momentum year on year with artists both established and new showing work in a variety of venues, including shops, pubs and cafes, and in their own homes right across East Sussex.

"It is now a highlight of the cultural year with around a hundred venues open for three weekends in September, attracting visitors from all over the south."
