Entering 2024, there is a lot to be positive about as we make good on our promise to make Lewes district an even better place to live.

For young people, fantastic improvements have been made to play areas across the district as part of a £400,000 programme of investment. As we move into the final six months of the project, most of the new play areas and upgrades are complete, with the final tranche of work on track to be finished by the summer.

Every year an array of community projects receive funding from the council's community infrastructure levy scheme, with people of all ages benefiting. Recently this has ranged from new and improved footpaths for children to use in the Salts Recreation Ground in Seaford to a new clubhouse for Ringmer Bowls Club. Expressions of interest for the latest round of this funding are now being reviewed and we look forward to backing many more schemes in 2024.

We are also making waste collections better this year by introducing wheeled bins which have various advantages, not least preventing wildlife from ripping open black sacks and scattering rubbish on our streets. These bins, which are made of 98% recycled plastic, will be delivered to homes in phases from February onwards.

Amidst all this progress, however, we are acutely aware that the cost of living crisis continues to bring hardship to many people. One of the ways we are helping the most vulnerable in our communities is by again supporting around 20 Welcome Spaces this winter, where people can enjoy a safe, warm place and hot drink. Information about these spaces, alongside help with finances, food and energy bills, are contained within this DN, and I encourage anyone who is struggling to reach out for the support available.

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Council welcomes emissions reductions

A new 6.8-hectare wetland being created in Lewes has already attracted an array of birdlife including migrating storks, egrets, cormorants and flocks of Canada geese.

The Cockshut is a 3km long chalk stream that flows from springs at the foot of the South Downs in Kingston, eventually joining the River Ouse before flowing out to sea. After it became clogged up by a non-native plant, the Cockshut Stream Restoration Project was launched and realignment of the stream began in 2023 to bring biodiversity improvements and alleviate the risk of flooding.

New footbridges and a raised walkway opening this spring will allow greater access for people to enjoy the area.

"When we made a climate emergency declaration in 2019 and put the council on course to net zero carbon by 2030, we were under no illusion about the scale of the challenge required to get there.

"However, when you consider our ambitious target and the significant progress being made, particularly in the reduction of emissions, it shows what can be accomplished and why we will double down on our determination to achieve all our climate change commitments."

The council is making significant progress in reducing carbon emissions and tackling climate change.

A 16.8% reduction in carbon emissions on the total baseline figure from 2018/19 and a 13.8% reduction in fleet emissions, confirms the council is on track in terms of its emissions commitments. Additionally, the carbon footprint of the district has reduced by 15% since 2018 – based on data from the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero.

Some of the key council actions include the installation of 12 electric vehicle charge points in two council car parks with another 52 planned for other car parks over the coming months, the roll-out of new electric vehicles for food waste

collections, flood management work across the district and the allocation of cost of living crisis funds for green energy and energy-saving initiatives.





Children enjoy playground makeovers

Playgrounds across the district have been upgraded thanks to a two-year £400,000 improvement programme by Lewes District Council.

The council is on track to refurbish and install new equipment at around 20 playgrounds by summer 2024, with most already completed.

Work is soon to begin on: Hillcrest Court in Newhaven, Valley Dip in Seaford, and Malling Rec and Stanley Turner Rec, both in Lewes.

The new play equipment is designed to appeal to different age groups and to children with different interests, needs and abilities. Benches and picnic tables are being added in some playgrounds to make the spaces more family friendly.

"It's great to see youngsters across a range of ages having fun with the new equipment.

"Of course, outdoor play areas come into their own in spring and summer, but I've been seeing children enjoying our newly refurbished play areas in (almost!) all weathers. It really shows how important these spaces are."

People are reminded that time is running out to contribute their views to the latest stage of consultation on future development in the district, which ends on February 8.

The spatial strategy and policies document is evidence-led, with the information gathered by council officers informing where development, such as new homes, employment space and community facilities, is appropriate and where it is not.

The government gives every council an annual housing target for new homes built – the target

for Lewes district is 602 homes per year, double the previous target.

However, the evidence gathered so far by the council, including 42,000 representations from residents and organisations that followed the 'call for sites' and issues and options documentation, shows that a maximum of 210 homes a year is possibly deliverable.

The consultation offers a range of opportunities for people to have their say, including drop-in events and exhibitions across the district. For more information visit: lewes-eastbourne.gov.uk/LLP-consultation

Garage sites earmarked for new homes

Council officers have identified garage sites across Lewes district that could potentially deliver around 45 new homes including three specialist disability homes.

Surveys are complete and a public consultation involving residents and garage users will soon be announced.

Council funding for landmark community projects

Lewes District Council's community infrastructure levy funding is making a fantastic difference to towns and villages in all parts of the district.

The Community Infrastructure Levy, known as CIL, is a charge that local authorities must apply to developments to fund local infrastructure projects – since 2015, Lewes District Council has allocated over £9 million to a wide range of community improvements.

Village halls, parks, footpaths, cycle paths, bridleways, sporting facilities, community safety and much more have benefited from CIL in Lewes district.

Thanks to £350,000 CIL funding from the council, projects most recently completed include new and improved footpaths in the Salts Recreation Ground in Seaford, Egret's Way – a walking and cycling route from Newhaven to Lewes, Newick Skate Park and a new clubhouse for Ringmer Bowls Club. Lewes's new cultural centre in Southover Road has welcomed over 30,000 visitors through its doors since opening in September 2023, representing 45% more people than anticipated.

Early research indicates that three-quarters of visitors have gone on to visit shops and other visitor attractions in the town, in turn boosting the local economy.

The new venue – a partnership between Lewes District Council, Charleston and East Sussex College Group – offers cultural opportunities for schools and community groups. East Sussex College Group students were the very first visitors to the space, enjoying a tour of the exhibitions and a careers talk, and returning for a series of creative workshops. Through new partnerships with Tenants of Lewes District and Lewes District Council's tenant involvement team, almost 100 participants from local families have enjoyed free artist-led workshops in the learning studio at Charleston in Lewes and offsite at food banks and community centres.

Nathaniel Hepburn, Director of Charleston, said:

"It's wonderful to see the venue already being utilised as a hub in the community – our community opening day in September was very well attended by local businesses, teachers, artists and makers, and the café and galleries are busy every day with families after school. We are excited to build on the educational and community work we've started."

As a result of the support shown to the project so far, Charleston has announced that the current exhibitions – Bring No Clothes: Bloomsbury and Fashion, and Jonathan Baldock: Through the joy of the senses – will be extended until March 3, 2024.

Starting in February 2024, Lewes District Council will introduce wheelie bin refuse collections across the district.

Lewes District Council (LDC) wheelie bins will be free, and residents will have a choice of three different bin options, including an easier to manoeuvre 140ltr slim-line bin or a gull-proof sack for residents with limited space or narrow pavements outside their home.

Why is the council doing this? The wheelie bins are a safer option for waste crews, reducing the risk of musculoskeletal and other injuries. They also make refuse less susceptible to attacks from gulls and other animals than black sacks, reducing neighbourhood litter.

Anyone who has a Lewes District Council issued wheelie bin is welcome to keep using it. However, non-LDC bins will need to be replaced with LDC-issued bins. This is because the safety of waste operatives must be guaranteed when the bins are attached, lifted and emptied into waste collection vehicles and this requires a standardised bin design.

What happens to old non-LDC bins? People are encouraged to reuse old bins – as a composter,

a water butt or perhaps cut down as a planter. The council is happy to collect residents' old bins and either donate them to groups for reuse or get them recycled into new bins.

The council will be rolling out its 98% recycled bins in phases: rural areas – including Barcombe, Ditchling and Chailey – will be first, followed by coastal areas, starting from Newhaven to Saltdean, in the spring. South Heighton, Bishopstone and Seaford will come next, followed by central parts of the district and remaining villages in the summer.

Alongside the wheelie bin roll out, the council is reviewing its refuse and recycling rounds and will be providing residents with a paper calendar in early 2024 with all dates for refuse, recycling and food waste collections for the coming year. Keep an eye out for your new collection calendar in early 2024.

Customers of the garden waste collection service will be able to renew their service from Monday, January 8. People are encouraged to renew before March 31 to avoid a break in their collections.

Customers who are new to this paid service can also sign up during this period and will be sent a 240-litre garden waste bin ahead of their first collection.

We do not charge for the service but invite you to make a donation to support our running costs."

Help with buying food

If you are unable to afford food, local community food projects might be able to help. Contact Lewes District Citizens Advice (see page 15) to discuss your situation.

They can give benefits, budgeting and debt advice while also offering support including a referral to your local food bank and they may be able to help with a fuel youcher.

Community hubs, voluntary and community sector organisations and local authorities can also make referrals to food banks. Once your referral has been received by your local food bank, they will be in touch to arrange collection of emergency food parcels.

Financial help for people on low incomes

Lewes District Council is offering funds to residents on a low income who will miss out on the government's £900 cost-of-living payments.

The 'Safety Net' payment is available to eligible residents who are struggling to keep warm, buy enough food or pay for essentials.

To qualify, you must currently receive housing benefit or a council tax reduction, but not one of the meanstested benefits that would qualify you for a cost-of-living payment from the government, unless you also qualify for a disability or carer's benefit. The award is a one-off payment of £400 and will be paid into your bank account. The funding is limited and will be paid

out on a first-come, first-served basis. Apply via the grants portal **grantapproval.co.uk**

If there is a risk your power will be cut off

Please seek help as soon as possible. Citizens Advice has set up an Extra Help Unit for people who are vulnerable or at risk of being disconnected by their energy provider. Fuel vouchers

If you are struggling financially and have a prepayment meter with less than £4 on it, and are not due a payment for a while, you can seek help. You can phone your utility company and ask for a fuel voucher – worth £49 for a family – which you can apply for twice a year. This does not have to be repaid. A PIN number is sent to your mobile phone. You show this at your top-up shop, along with your gas card or electricity key.
