Multi-million pound project for warmer, greener homes

Architects' designs show how existing buildings will be refurbished and repurposed to improve the facilities on offer. The whole site will be relandscaped to increase biodiversity, including the planting of native trees and shrubs.

The underused Shakespeare Hall will be opened up to incorporate a café and new terraced area. Beside it, a new play area will be built using the slopes and other natural features of the park.

The Cricket Pavilion will also benefit from improved accessibility and layout.

A circular path route is planned, along with new

seating and exercise equipment, while access to the nature reserve will also be enhanced.

Additionally, public toilets at the park are being modernised.

Further technical work on the designs is scheduled over the coming months, ahead of a contractor appointment in the winter.

Construction will begin in spring 2025 and be completed by early 2026.

The works at Fort Road Recreation Ground are funded by the UK government and are part of the Re-imagining Newhaven programme.

Lewes District Council has announced it will invest nearly £2.7 million in making 267 council homes more energy efficient and cheaper to run, supported by a £2 million grant from the government.

The government grant was part of a consortium bid with Eastbourne Borough Council.

The Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund invited applications for grant funding to help the council meet its target of net zero carbon by 2030.

The announcement follows an in-depth study by council officers that looked at the most realistic decarbonisation solutions, such as retrofitting eligible homes to improve their energy performance.

This project will help accelerate the progress already being made to reduce carbon emissions.

In November 2023, the council reported a 16.8% reduction in carbon emissions from 2018/19 and a 13.8% reduction in fleet emissions.

With the help of this grant funding, the council will reduce the carbon footprint of local council homes by implementing affordable retrofits, subject to their eligibility.

By simply upgrading windows, doors and draughtproofing to the highest standards, a 20% reduction in energy use is possible.

# New wheelie hins rolled out get across Lewes district



### New home gives family 'fresh lease of life'

A family has moved into a new and specially adapted home after waiting patiently for many years to find a suitable property.

The father and grown-up son and daughter all have multiple and highly complex disabilities, so much so, the layout of their old home meant father and son hadn't been able to see each other for a number of years, even though they lived in the same house.

Lewes District Council stepped in with partners to build the family a new home in Ringmer that includes all the necessary adaptations to allow the husband, wife and their two children to lead a full life together.

A specialist occupational therapy team has helped design the new home – ramps, hoists and a room for a 24-hour carer are amongst the many features being incorporated into the property.

In addition to funding from Lewes District Council and Homes England, a disabilities facilities grant of £180,000 was secured for the project.

### Homes completed at former police station site

A development of 21 new affordable council homes at Stowe Place, on the site of the former police station in Newhaven, has been completed.

The Lewes District Council development comprises 15 two-bedroom and four one-bedroom apartments and two three-bedroom houses. A ground floor flat has been purpose built for wheelchair users and 11 other flats will have added accessibility and increased scope for adaptations.

The properties are 100% electric and benefit from other sustainability features including high insulation specifications, a green living roof and solar photovoltaic panels.

### Extra parking in Newhaven

Visitors to Newhaven town centre can look forward to additional parking on offer with the reopening of the two upper levels in the Dacre Road car park.

The council hopes to secure planning permission for the new lighting designs in the car park soon, with installation quickly following and visitors being welcomed again in the summer.

The staged delivery of new wheelie bins to homes in Lewes district is progressing well, with phase three soon to get underway.

New refuse bins are free to district residents and people have a choice of different bin options, including an easier-to-move 140-litre slimline bin.

Phase three covers Bishopstone, Bishopstone Village, Denton, Norton, Seaford and South Heighton. People living in these areas can let the council know what size bin they prefer by 20 May. Council crews will deliver these bins at the end of May and throughout June.

Phase four covers Beddingham, Falmer, Firle, Glynde, Iford, Itford, Kingston, Lewes, Newhaven (C7), Northease, Piddinghoe, the final few homes in Ringmer (most deliveries to Ringmer have already been made), Rodmell, Southease, Southerham, Swanborough, Tarring Neville and Telscombe Village. These residents need to let the council know their preferred bin size by 1 July, ahead of bin deliveries during July and August.

Playgrounds in Seaford, South Chailey, Ditchling, Peacehaven and Lewes are the latest to be upgraded in a £400,000 improvement programme.

Aquila Park and The Peverells in Seaford, The Martletts in South Chailey, Longpark Corner in Ditchling, Cinquefoil in Peacehaven and Landport Rec, De la Warr Rd and Kingfisher Court in Lewes, have all been transformed.

Lewes District Council is on track to refurbish and install new equipment at 18 playgrounds by this summer, with Valley Dip in Seaford, Hillcrest Court in Newhaven and the Stanley Turner Ground and Malling Rec in Lewes due for improvements in July.

The new play equipment has been designed to appeal to different age groups and to children with different interests, needs and abilities.

Picnic tables have been added in some playgrounds to make the spaces more family friendly.

Thanks to everyone who took part in public consultations that helped shape the revamped playgrounds.

Task Force, run by Keep Britain Tidy, and Newhaven's Wayfinding and Public Realm Improvement Scheme.

Developed in Switzerland, the machine uses low pressure steam and bio-degradable

detergents to deep-clean pavement surfaces, lifting gum and grime and then vacuuming it up. The kit also includes a steam wand that can be used for removing graffiti on some surfaces.

The council's street cleansing teams will use it first in Newhaven town centre, preparing the way for murals to be installed as part of the Look Again Supergraphics Festival this June (see page 11), before moving on to Lewes town centre and other parts of the district.

Chris Ketley, Chair of the Re-imagining Newhaven Board, said: "This is one of the fundamental parts of the improvement to the high street, being delivered by the Re-imagining Newhaven Board, as part of the c.£1 million Wayfinding and Public Realm Improvements project."

Wildflowers are starting to bloom on councilowned land across Lewes district as part of work to improve diversity.

The council has been encouraging wildflowers to flourish for several years by introducing wild areas which are particularly attractive to pollinators and provide ideal habitat for creatures such as beetles and lizards.

In the autumn, council contractor idverde cuts and collects the grasses which are then sent for green waste recycling at a local facility.

By leaving this cut and collect until later in the year, the seeds from the flowers fall naturally onto the ground and germinate the following year, providing new natural habitat.

"Lewes District Council is committed to doing all it can for nature, including creating nature-friendly areas of our parks and recreation grounds.

Seahaven Swim and Fitness Centre in Newhaven has been given a boost after Lewes District Council successfully secured £149,650 from the Swimming Pool Support Fund.

It has been awarded £109,650 towards Photo Voltaic (PV) panels for heating the water and £40,000 for pool covers.

Meanwhile, work is underway to re-open Ringmer Swimming Pool. Threatened with permanent closure in 2022, Lewes District Council (LDC) stepped in with a rescue plan and has been working with East Sussex County Council (ESCC) and Wave Active to bring the facility back into use in the autumn.

Like any older swimming pool, the years of pumping and filtering millions of litres of water and chemicals

have taken its toll on the original plant machinery and needs replacing. Funding from LDC and ESCC is making the replacement of this essential equipment possible.





Charleston's second season of exhibitions has now opened at its new cultural centre on Southover Road, a partnership with Lewes District Council that in its first season welcomed over 40,000 visitors.

A series of new initiatives has been introduced to further welcome members of the local community as well as visitors to the town. There are British Sign Language tours for people who are deaf or have hearing loss, and Quiet Mornings that will give visitors

with additional needs the opportunity to enjoy the exhibitions at less busy times.

Additionally, monthly Pay What You Can days, taking place on the last Sunday of the month, have been introduced to make sure the new exhibitions are affordable to all. The next one takes place on 26 May.

Charleston's partnership with Tenants of Lewes District continues, delivering free artist-led workshops for families during the holidays. Charleston is also providing further learning opportunities for local children and young people from schools and colleges including the East Sussex College Group.

Since September the charity has been working with staff and pupils at Priory School's Oak Centre on a coproduced project – pupils' work created in workshops led by artist educator Tanvi Kant is on display in the first schools' exhibition at Charleston in Lewes, taking place in Project Space and free to view.

Following the success of the first season, the two new ticketed exhibitions – Dorothy Hepworth and Patricia Preece: An Untold Story and Duos: The Art of Collaboration – celebrate the creative force of partnerships and both run until 8 September.

Newhaven is preparing to host a new monthlong festival of events, workshops, walks and community gatherings to accompany 12 specially commissioned artworks installed across the town.

Some of the biggest names in graphic art, illustration and street art will be creating murals for the Look Again Supergraphics Festival in June.

Artists include Anthony Burrill, Annie Frost Nicholson, Amber Elise, Supermundane, Eelus, See Creatures and Ellie Fryer.

Artworks have been designed to represent the community, local landscape and history of Newhaven, and the festival will see blank walls and neglected streets converted into spaces of colour and creativity with murals and supergraphics. These are large-scale graphics, typography or imagery used to enhance big surfaces such as walls or ceilings.

In preparation, organisers held a public meeting for residents to understand the kind of art they would like to be featured.

# Council provides extra £20,000 to alleviate food poverty



Lewes District Council began 2024 by awarding £20,000 to a network of community organisations that support people in poverty to access food, as part of its continued support for residents in need through the cost of living crisis.

The money was provided to members of Lewes District Emergency Food Network, a coalition of food banks and community food cooperatives.

Last year the council committed £750,000 to a Cost of Living Crisis Fund that has been giving

ongoing support to people who are hardest hit through a raft of schemes and measures.

Out of this, over £50,000 has so far been provided directly to local food banks and projects.

The array of council schemes to help people through the cost of living crisis have included 'Safety Net' payments for people on low incomes, a voluntary sector grants programme, welcome spaces for people to gather in a warm place over winter months, financial support for Lewes District Citizens Advice and much more.

"We have prioritised the wellbeing of local people ever since the start of this cost of living crisis and I am proud of the help we have been able to provide so far.

We will continue to do all we can to support Lewes district residents."

## Thanks to residents over local plan consultation



















Over 2,000 individuals, groups and organisations commented between November and February, following 42,000 representations in response to the 'call for sites' and issues and options documentation.

The plan is evidence led, with the information gathered by council officers informing where development, such as new homes, employment space and community facilities, is appropriate and where it is not.

The council ensured residents had multiple ways of sharing their views, whether in person, online or in writing. The next round of

consultation will include early engagement with all town and parish councils and will include a focus on getting more young people involved in the process.

The programme of education and supervised physical activity is a collaboration between two GP surgeries – Old School Surgery and Seaford Medical Practice – and Wave Active, the operator of local sports and leisure centres on behalf of Lewes District Council.

All 17 patients who took part were given individual assessments before participating in weekly sessions over 12 weeks at Downs Leisure Centre, supervised and delivered by Wave Active's team of health practitioners.

The innovative pilot scheme was designed to keep people healthier for longer and give residents the right care, in the right place and at the right time, in accordance with aspirations of the Sussex Health and Care Plan.

Duncan Kerr, Chief Executive of Wave Active, said: "The pilot was a great success with patients, who were monitored throughout, reporting positive improvements to their health and wellbeing.

"Wave Active and the Seaford Primary Care Network are using our collective expertise and resources to deliver interventions that encourage healthier living and address the health inequalities that lead to conditions such as coronary heart disease.

"Our GPs are brilliant and do an incredible job in Seaford, but there is undoubtedly great scope to improve and develop the way residents manage their own health and wellbeing, by employing a more integrated approach to healthcare in communities."

All the patients who took part in the pilot attended weekly 60-minute supervised sessions at Downs Leisure Centre incorporating educational and practical elements, both of which focused on managing hypertension, and underwent a range of tests, including cholesterol and blood pressure, at the start of the programme and at the end of the 12 weeks.

Dr Joe Ljevar, from Old School Surgery in Seaford, said: "The benefits of people leading more active lifestyles is well documented and, as a primary care network, in partnership with Wave Active, we hope, through interventions like this hypertensive pilot we can impact on short and long-term health gains for the Seaford community."
